

Stephanie led efforts to secure and facilitate \$1.2 billion in funding for urban infill infrastructure, brownfield cleanup, and transit-oriented development in California. She is renowned for developing strategic public, private, and nonprofit partnerships to transform thousands of acres of blighted, abandoned industrial properties into new commercial, residential, retail, and public uses, and she facilitated the development of more than 200 acres of new waterfront trails and parks.

Stephanie began her career as a research hydrologist at the U.S. Geological Survey, where for six years she worked in the contaminant hydrology program. She also served as a technical analyst for the California State Legislature, providing analysis of environmental regulation and legislative reports on topical issues including the state of brownfield redevelopment in California.

Stephanie is a recognized expert in land recycling and has served on numerous boards and commissions including the San Francisco Port Commission and the Los Angeles Industrial Development Committee. She is currently serving on a team selected by Governor Brown's administration to design new strategies for funding urban infill given the recent elimination of redevelopment agencies in California. Stephanie is a graduate of the University of Illinois at Champaign-Urbana, with a BS in Geology, and San Jose State University with a MS in Hydrogeology.
